GANAR! and ALI-RU both won their racing fleet in the 2017 TRI-SERVICES REGATTA on Saturday. Of the 40 boats racing, 15 sailed in either the spinnaker or non-spinnaker racing division. Leading each of the 3 cruising fleets were CAT'S PAWS, BARBARA JEAN, and IRIS. Breezes were in the high teens with gusts above 20 knots on the course laid out in Hampton Roads Harbor. With a grin on his face, one of the competitors mentioned the importance of defensive driving under the conditions. Principal Race Officer Tim Dull (NNSA) said that "... 40 boats represented the Air Force, Army, and Navy in this race which has been run every year since 1975." Tim added that "... small craft warning level winds lead to some sporting chases around Hampton Bar." In the "team" scoring for the Tri-Service Cup, Army (Old Point Comfort Yacht Club) won the cup back from the Navy represented by Norfolk Navy Sailing Association. **Speaking of Lighthouses**. If a real, honest to goodness lighthouse is something you've always wanted, check out this one. The *Craighill Channel Lower Range Front Light Station* sits 2 miles off the North Point State Park (Maryland). This light marks the channel that runs from the Bay to the mouth of the Patapsco River. The structure is 144 years old and has had no keeper since 1964, when the US Coast Guard automated our lights. The light has a one and one-half story keepers living space, which is currently inhabited by birds. Bidding closes on September 15<sup>th</sup>, this coming Friday. The Saltwater Cowboy, a film about ocean racer Mike Plant. Twenty-five (25) years ago, October 16, 1992, Mike Plant, heading for France, sailed 60 foot Coyote out of New York Harbor, planning to do his 4<sup>th</sup> circumnavigation in the Vendee Globe. A few days later he asked a passing ship to pass along information that his electronics were down. He was never heard from again. Coyote was found weeks later 500 miles north of the Azores, up side down and missing her keel. His nephew Thomas Simmons, 10 years old at the time, has now put together a film about his uncle's life and his immersion in ocean racing. The film is expected to be released to the public this Fall.
