Skippers and crew had to be 21 years old or younger as of the end of 2019. Twenty-one (21) teams of 2 each raced Saturday and Sunday, in 15-20 gusting and buckets of rain. The ODU sailing team ran the regatta for the high schoolers, under the watchful supervision of ODU Head Sailing Coach Mitch Brindley and several other volunteer adult race officials. **ROUND THE LIGHTS RACE.** While Thursday the *BIG BREEZE* proved to be too much wind for even many schooners on the Bay, on Saturday there was little to no breeze for the 50 signed up to race in a southern Bay favorite race 'ROUND THE LIGHTS. Of the 50 who started, 11 (10 PHRF racers and 1 Cruiser) actually finished the race. It was mid-afternoon by the time any breeze arrived that was equal to the fierce flood current making sailing toward Thimble Light near impossible early on. Race chairman Tim Etherington, put it

this way: "Winds out of the north at 7-8 at the start into a flooding tide. They quickly became light and variable and stayed that way for much of the day and into early afternoon. The winds filled in around 8 knots around 3pm after much of the fleet already threw in the towel. The last boat to start was the first boat to finish. All but one of the boats that finished turned right and headed first to Middle Ground. Speed over the ground was about 2.5 knots even without the wind. The boats that decided to turn left and go to Thimble Shoal first quickly found out the current was not going to let the enter the bay. Many drifted forward and backward trying to get out before giving up. Some decided to then turn toward Middle Ground basically starting over but by then it was too late. Each year we give an award to the fastest wrong way boat. The difference is typically around 30 minutes. This year there was only one wrong way boat that finished, Jonathan, and they were over two hours behind the leader. It was a fun day on the water, just not a racing day." The first three finishers overall in the pursuit race were: 1.Don DeLoatch, Riff Raff; 2.Pete Hunter, Wairere; 3.Neil and Lis Biondi, Danger Paws. All three were PHRF A boats. Old Point Comfort YC administers the 'RTL each year.
